




Visiting Author - Jayden Boundry

On Friday 19 May, the Years 1 and 2's were enthralled by storyteller and author Jayden Boundry, a guest author at this year's Margaret River Readers and Writers Festival. Jayden entertained us all by sharing some personal stories and demonstrating his skills in playing the didgeridoo.

Jayden Boundry has written a wonderful book (Illustrated by Tyrown Waigana) called Noongar Boodja Waangkan: Noongar First Words. Noongar is the language of the Noongar nation and is spoken by 14 different groups across the southwest corner of Western Australia.

CyberSafety

Last week I was made aware of some online Mean on Purpose behaviour amongst some of our Year 6

students, mostly via Snapchat. Some of it had been going on since Year 4.

I spoke to our local police as these behaviours were very worrying (circulation and rating of images, making fake profiles, mean words including 'go kill yourself' etc).

What concerned me the most is that our kids did not report this. They kept it to themselves and allowed it to continue for an extended period.

If you are choosing to let your child use Social Media then you must be continually monitoring their chats and must check in with them regularly. Many parents were unaware too and were surprised at the extent of the Mean on Purpose behaviours. The 'tween' brain is not ready to deal with social media and the effects of Cyberbullying can be so devastating. Please check in with your child if you haven't already. 
National Simultaneous Story Time
